Ron Hanson Medal



1942 - 2017 (dec.)

The Ron Hanson Medal was introduced at the Masters Trans-Tasman in June 2010 to commemorate Australian flagbearers appointed for Open and Masters international tournaments. Ron Hanson began playing Touch Football in 1968, playing in the very first Touch competition after a stellar Rugby League career representing Eastern Suburbs. Hanson was captain for New South Wales against Queensland in 15 Test matches with an undefeated record. In 1976 he became the first Australian captain, in the inaugural Trans-Tasman series played in New Zealand, where Australia won all matches

Phil Smith Medallist




Phil Smith was one of the founding members and the first Life Member of Touch Football Australia. He is regarded as the driving force behind the concept and implementation of the first National Championships. This award was first instigated at the 2007 World Cup in recognition of Phil's vision and contribution to elite Touch in Australia.

This medal is awarded to those considered to have shown the most passion, enthusiasm, dedication, commitment and Australian spirit during an international event. All members of an Australian Open/Masters touring party are eligible to nominate.



Australia with distinction at the




Richard was a great sportsman and had excelled in many sports at elite

The Terry Jack Medal



The Terry Jack Medal is awarded to the Player of the Series in the Mens Open Division at the National Touch League and was first introduced with the Elite 8 Competition in 2011.

Terry was the first inductee into the TFA Hall of Fame in 1988 and he represented Australia between 1980 and 1987, including captaining the Australian Men's Open side on the 1986 tour of New Zealand.

Terry is respected by all for the example he has set as a dedicated player and leader in Touch Football. Terry has two caps for Australia and was also the Queensland Men's Open captain on seven occasions at the National Championships

The Karen Smith Medal is awarded to the Player of the Series in the Womens Open Division at the National Touch League and was first introduced with the Elite 8 Competition in 2011.

Karen was the second inductee into the TFA Hall of Fame in 1988 and has been involved with Touch Football as a state and national representative player since 1980. She has captained NSW and Australia on many occasions and her list of awards for Player's Player, Player of the Final and Player of the Series is extensive. Rick Borg Medalist



The Rick Borg Medal is named in honour of the benchmark performances set by Rick Borg at National and International Levels. He was inducted in the TFA Hall of Fame in 2004 and at state, national and international events, Rick has excelled as a Touch Football referee. In 1995 when he rose to the position of the World's number one Touch Football Referee, a position he held firmly for 12 years.

Rick has achieved 71 international caps for his country, consisting of 46 World Cup appearances, 22 Tests and three other internationals. In 2013, the Rick Borg Medal was created, awarded to the top referee at the National Touch League (NTL).
