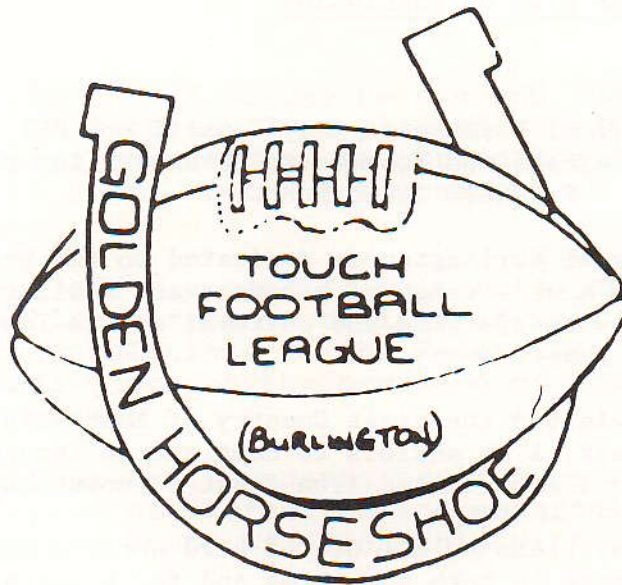

The History of Canadian Touch Football

It really all began in 1923, in England of all places. The game being played at that time was the one that we Canadians know as soccer. A young gentleman by the name of William Webb Ellis tired of the rule which stated that the ball was "never to be handled." Well, it seems that William displayed a "fine disregard for the rules of football" and simply caught one of those passes, tucked it under his arm, and ran on down the field towards his opponents' goal line!

As young Ellis took off down the field, you can bet that his opponents added a new meaning to the word tackle!

Seven years later, a Canadian by the name of Warren Stevens instigated the forward pass thereby laying the foundation for the game of Touch Football. A few adjustments here and there have taken the sport to the one that is played today.

One would presume that a form of recreational touch Football has been played ever since. No detail is known but when you look at a football, you just have a tendency to pick it up, give it a little spin and feel the need to throw it around.

In 1958 a man by the name of Ron Shipp felt such a need. Ron was washing his car and Frank Bolla was fulfilling an age old tradition of watching someone else work. As Ron was finishing his work he reached inside the trunk and noticed his old football. Frank, up on the balcony, immediately got that feeling and yelled down to Ron - "Hey Ron, want to throw the ball around? I can get some guys from my building."

Ten businessmen were rounded up and the first documented game of Touch Football was played. The fellows enjoyed the first game and arranged to play on subsequent Saturday mornings in the park.

The rules at that time were fairly simple. They were basically made up of the tackle rules with two variations - one hand touch replaced the tackle, and three steamboats allowed the quarterback sufficient time to get the pass away. No field goals were used but kicking for a single point was accepted. At that time, the snap was taken directly from the center by the quarterback.

On one of the Saturdays, another group of fellows who lived in Lachine watched for a while and finally came over to talk to the players. From this discussion came a challenge for the following Saturday and a two team league was formed.

Then came the next step which has become a tradition synonymous with our game. The two teams went down to a tavern after the final game of the season. The breweries in Canada owe a real debt of gratitude to these guys!

While in the bar, contact was made with players from two baseball teams who were wrapping up their season. The principals agreed to discuss the possibilities for playing and arrangements were made to have a meeting in 1959.

The four teams formed the Lakeshore Touch Football League and began playing a series of scheduled games that summer. For the record, the four teams were: The Dorval Dukes, Lachine, Proctor & Gamble and Pulp & Paper. The Dorval Dukes won the first league championship with a record of 6 wins, one loss, and one tie.

By 1963 the league had expanded to six teams and obtained sponsorship from O'Keefe Breweries for trophies and sweaters.

Referees were introduced in 1964, at a rate of \$3.00 per hour. (Inflation affects everything).

In 1965 Ron moved to Ottawa and worked with Larry Williams to start up a Fall league in the area. Four teams began play that year. The Ottawa Civil Service Recreational Association was convinced to try the game in 1966 and a twenty-four team league was formed. The official rules at that time included a combination of basketball and football disciplines. The game included unlimited forward passing, three downs for the field on a field measuring 40 by 30 yards.

In 1966 Touch Football was fortunate enough to find Ron in Toronto. Once again the game was introduced to a large group of participants and a new league was formed. Ten teams were started in that first year and arrangements were made to have the winning team in each of the three leagues meet for a championship tournament at alternating sites.

People kept relocating and the gospel of Touch kept spreading until in 1971, the Canadian Touch Football Association recognized the sport and formed a committee to help direct the development. In 1971 the Canadian Touch Football Association was formed with John Glatzmayer as the chairman.

Leagues continued to spring up all over Canada and by 1974 interest was sufficient to allow Larry Williams to obtain a \$15,000 grant from National Health and Welfare to conduct a development tour across Canada. Six cities were covered with this tour, including; Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary, Vancouver, Victoria and Nanaimo. Two teams were involved in the clinics - the 1973 National Champion Hamilton Picton Tavern and the C.T.F.A. All Stars. The sport was demonstrated to phys. ed. teachers, recreational departments and interested participants in each of the cities.

John continued as Chairman of the C.T.F.A. until 1974 when Jim McCarfny succeeded him. By that time, many leagues had been formed and a variety of levels of play had developed. The C.T.F.A. organized a Touchbowl tournament for the Canadian championship and teams from all over Canada participated.

In 1979 a new organizational structure was developed under the guidance of the Canadian Amateur Football Association, now Football Canada. The development of Touch Football was directed by a Touch Working Committee with Fred Vickers as Chairman. This new committee continued the development of the sport in the manner of the previous organizations but, with Fitness Canada support, was able to take the game to other participants than the original audience.

Touch Football is now being played by most segments of Canada Athletes - Youth, Women, Masters, Wheelchair as well as Men. The new interest in the sport is attributable to the efforts of each of the Provincial Associations who have devoted so much time and effort in implementing Touch programs within their province.

In 1986, Jim Hurd assumed the role of Chairman of the Touch Working Committee which continues to develop programs to take the sport to new participants.

One of the most exciting new developments has been the participation of Canada in the Federation of International Touch. Led by Dave Nelson of Burlington, Ontario, Canada is participating in games with Australia in 1987 and plans on competing with other countries in 1988 and beyond.

Touch Football has come along way since the first days back in the sixties. The development is a tribute to the efforts of the organizers and administrators but, is really attributable to the kinship that the game promotes. Watch, play, administer, officiate, coach - just STAY IN TOUCH.

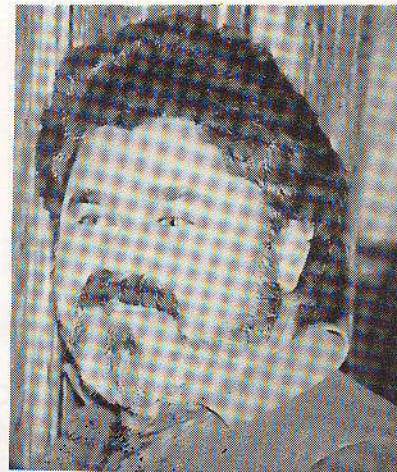

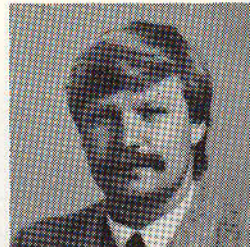
In conclusion and as spokesman for the "fellas" and "sheela's" from Australia we hope the memories of this tournament will live with us all for many years to come.

CERTAINLY THERE HAVE BEEN SOME MAJOR CONCESSIONS AT BOTH ENDS AS WE AMALGAMATE THE RULES OF OUR DIFFERENT GAMES. THE INTENTION OF DEVELOPING UNIVERSAL RULES THROUGH THE FEDERATION OF INTERNATIONAL TOUCH WAS NOT TO REPLACE THE STYLE OF TOUCH IN EITHER COUNTRY, BUT RATHER TO PROMOTE INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS THROUGH THE GAME OF TOUCH.

I WAS FORTUNATE ENOUGH TO ATTEND THE A.T.A. NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS IN PERTH, WESTERN AUSTRALIA IN APRIL OF THIS YEAR. THIS WAS A REWARDING EXPERIENCE FOR ME AS IT OPENED MY EYES TO THE OUTSTANDING OPPORTUNITIES WE ALL HAVE TO TRAVEL AROUND THE WORLD ENJOYING THE SPORT WE ALL TRULY LOVE. “WHO TOOK THE FUN OUT OF TOUCH FOOTBALL”

If you prefer to participate in a good, clean, enjoyable fun-game of touch football, don't use officials to control the game. Let the players do it.

This was clearly demonstrated to me one day this fall when, because their opponents did not show up, a team quickly arranged an exhibition game against another team which had just finished playing. Neither team cared about league points; they just wanted to play football. They played for one hour without any officials on the field. And they had fun doing it (the kind of fun you remember having when you played those 100-95 score games of touch football as a kid with the “gang”).

There was no complaining about being touched, no rough play and no bad conduct. The fellows played under the honour system: touches were called by the defensive players and respected by the ball carrier; offsidings were not called; all but flagrant offside passes were ignored; interference, which occurred many times in my opinion, was accepted as a normal aggressive tactic by all players. Above all, there was no rough play and not one foul word to boot!

Yet the players were having a ball. Opponents were laughing and applauding each other. Teammates were berating each other for mistakes made, but in a jocular manner. I remarked to one of the players on the bench that it was a good thing that I was not officiating the game, because I would probably spoil it for the players. He replied most sincerely and profoundly, “You're right – it would spoil the fun, wouldn't it.”

One could conclude from the above example that the presence of officials restricts the fun of the game. But in my opinion, it's the attitude of the players and coaches which dictates whether a game will be fun or not. The above example was a pick-up game. But place these same players in a game that counts, and a different kind of player emerges: the problem competitor. He is the player who can't control his aggressiveness nor his tongue. He is the coach who has not read the rule book nor cares to discipline himself or his players, thus incurring silly penalties. He is the team captain who has no concept of what his responsibilities are regarding control of his teammates, and how to relate to the officials. In particular, he is the “hot dog” who has no respect for anyone at anytime. They are the collective cause of the lack of fun in the game, not the officials.

There are many accomplished and gentlemen athletes in the game of touch football. Contrary to popular belief, these two traits are consistently synonymous. However, until players, teams and leagues individually or collectively rid themselves of the problem competitor, you can continue to expect these players to take the fun out of touch football.

So don't blame the officials if your next game turns sour. Look to the problem competitor. No doubt you will find one on the opponent's team, but don't overlook your own team. Or you! You yourself, may be taking the fun out of your own game.
